- Birdwatch Observe the movements/actions of live birds and collect feathers if possible.





BIRDS ARE THE ONLY ANIMALS WITH FEATHERS.

TRUE! (UNLESS YOU COUNT A FEW DINOSAURS)

SWANS HAVE AS MANY AS 25,000 FEATHERS.

TRUE -

small songbirds - between 1,500 and 3,000 feathers,

eagles and birds of prey - 5,000 to 8,000

swans - as many as 25,000

Hummingbirds have the fewest feathers at 1,000.

While penguins have perhaps the densest (warmest) feather coat with about <u>100</u> <u>feathers per square inch</u>.

BIRDS CAN FEEL THEIR FEATHERS, JUST LIKE HUMAN HAIR.

THEY CANNOT CONTROL EACH FEATHER, ONLY THE WING AS A WHOLE.

FALSE - THEY HAVE TINY MUSCLES CONNECTED TO EACH FOLLICLE.

BIRDS ONLY NEED FEATHERS FOR FLYING.


Think of plumage as a sort of rain coat, sunscreen, winter jacket, armor and fashion statement all in one.

Feathers:

- protect birds from the elements, thorns and insects
- repel water
- provide camouflage
- help birds attract mates with a showy plume display

HELP BIRDS BUILD NESTS

Do provide any combination of the following:

- Dead twigs
- Dead leaves
- Dry grass (make sure the grass hadn't been treated with pesticides)
- Feathers
- Plant fluff or down (e.g. cattail fluff, cottonwood down)
- Moss
- Bark strips
- Pine needles
- Wool yarn under 5 inches long

Do provide nesting material in any of the following ways:

- in piles on the ground (works well for leaves and twigs)
- in clean wire-mesh suet cages, or in mesh bags hung on tree trunks, fence posts, or railings
- pushed into tree crevices
- draped over vegetation
- in open-topped berry baskets
- spiral wire hangers made especially for putting out nest material (one type looks like an oversized honey-dipper)

Don't provide:

- plastic strips
- tinsel
- cellophane
- aluminum foil
- dryer lint


