We are all artists in some way....
















An artist can work with paint, clay, glass or sculpture An artist can design buildings too!








3. How do you sharpen a pencil and wash a paint brush?

A pencil sharpener has a sharp blade that shaves off the wood around the lead as you turn it. Before pencil sharpeners were used people had to use a very sharp knife to sharpen a pencil. The very first pencil sharpener was patented by a French man named Bernard Lassimonne in 1828!

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










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

What you'll need for this activity...








- 1. grab yourself a small bowl plastic is best. ...
- 2. tear the newspaper into strips or break up the egg box.
- 3. make up a mix of paper mache paste 1:1 flour and water.
- 4. dip the newspaper/egg box bits into the paste and layer over the bowl.

- 1. dip the newspaper into the paste and layer over the bowl.
- 2. you'll want a few layers the more the better. ...
- 3. Smooth it down
- 4. leave to dry overnight





Once the papier-mâché is dry and crisp, it is ready to paint.


Think about your colour wheel and use those colours to decorate the bowl.

Once the paint is dry you can use PVA to varnish it

Salt Dough







To make salt dough, all you need is

- •2 cups of plain flour,
- •1 cup of table salt
- •UP to a cup of water.
- •You can also add good quality food colouring to dye your salt dough before drying!
 When we say "cup" .. any cup works, so long as you keep the proportions the same.



To make your salt dough

- 1. Measure your ingredients
- 2. Put the salt and flour into a bowl
- 3. Stir together
- 4. Measure your water
- 5. Add the water to your flour and salt gradually mixing well. Once the mixture is combined turn out onto a floured surface
- 6. Knead the dough until smooth you could add good quality food colouring to portions of the dough or leave it and paint once dry.
- 7. You could model with your dough or roll out like pastry and use cutters .

Baking your salt dough

- 1. Preheat the oven ask an adult! 80°C (175°F)
- 2. Put your salt dough pieces on parchment paper on a baking tray
- Ask your adult to put the tray into the oven for you
- 4. Bake for at least 12 hours! (overnight is good) your items must be baked until solid!
- 5. Get your adult to take them out of the oven, place on a cooling tray and wait
- 6. Once cooled they are ready to paint












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6. Make two of the following:- an invitation, a book mark, a greeting card, a poster.



To make a book mark you could use cardboard from a empty cereal box and decorate with paint, crayons or any other of the suggested materials.







To make an invitation card you could use card from an empty cereal box covered with plain paper and then use those methods in section 4 and 5 to create it. Your invitation can be for any occasion. Who is it for? Where is the event? What time? Who is inviting them?






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Make a greeting card.
Use your finger paint to make pictures.
You could use plain paper and then stick this on to card.
